How Much Weight Can Your Vehicle Tow?

Determine the Weight of Any RV That Interests You.

Compare the **Dry Weight** of any RV you look at against your vehicle's maximum towing capacity to determine if they are compatible. Be sure to take into account the additional weight of fluids and supplies, which is typically 300 to 500 pounds.

What's Your Hitch Type?

Some RVs require their towing vehicle to have a specific type of hitch (or even truck-bed length), so it's important to know what type of hitch your vehicle has (standard, gooseneck, etc.). This will further help you determine compatible types of RVs.

What Type of RV is Right For You?

There are motorhomes, travel trailers, truck campers, pop-ups, fifth wheels, toy haulers - the list goes on! Do some research on each type of RV, and you'll quickly narrow down which type of RV is best for your needs.





Browse Brands to Find Your Best Fit

Tour Some RVs!


